Proposed Budget for the Salem Central School District

Expenditure Summary

This year's expenses reflect a budget increase of 3.67%. The majority of the budgetary increase is in the program component, which funds student programs and special education needs for students. The district plans to hire a School Resource Officer (SRO) to enhance the safety of the school. SROs are law enforcement personnel who work in community-oriented policing to provide a feeling of safety among students and staff, while reducing the likelihood of property damage, personal injury, and criminal activity. The Washington County Sheriff's Department will assist school districts through the interviewing and hiring process. This Resource Officer will be on campus during the school year.

Library Information

New York State Education Law (under which libraries operate) provides that propositions requesting changes in the money for local libraries may be placed on the local school ballot. Such money is not in the school budget and has no impact on that budget. The district's local library relies on community support to help maintain the level of service now available.

Revenue Summary

This year's budget shows a decrease in Non-Resident tuition revenue. In an effort to balance expenses and revenues, while continuing to maintain programs, the district has reduced expenditures that will impact Pre-Kindergarten transportation and the purchasing of equipment, materials, and supplies. The district is utilizing a large sum from the ERS reserve to help close the gap in revenue and has budgeted a 1.75% tax increase, which is below the tax cap levy of 2.25%.
